## Being at Home With God

"I am the true vine, and my *Father is the vine grower.* <sup>2</sup> *He* removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. <sup>3</sup> You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. <sup>4</sup> Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. <sup>5</sup> I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. - John 15:1-5

Jesus speaks these words to the disciples as part of what has come to be known as the Farewell Discourse – his final instructions to the disciples before he is arrested and crucified. They have eaten together in the Upper Room and shared the cup and bread.


The word "abide" is used repeatedly in this passage and expresses the idea of "dwelling, enduring, and remaining." To abide is not a fleeting gesture. When we abide in Christ there is a vital, living connection between us – like branches



stretching off a vine. Our lives as Christians cannot produce fruit unless be are fed by the vine, from Jesus himself. Energy flows through the vine to the fruit.

When we are IN Christ.
When our emotions are IN
Christ. When our thoughts are
IN Christ. When our actions are
IN Christ, we produce an
abundance of fruit – the fruit of
love.

But the branches can't produce that fruit without a little pruning. As it's warming up, many of us are itching to get outside and putter about in our yards and gardens. And one of the first tasks may be to look for any damage caused by the cold and snow and ice. Which of the trees or bushes have taken a beating? There will probably need to be some pruning in our yards, and as this passage attests, some





that will allow us to more deeply connect with Christ, to abide in him, to find a home in God's word.

What things are keeping us from God? What barriers keep us from being at home in his love and mercy? What is it that we need to prune from our lives?

The late Henri Nouwen observed that many of us live as if we've forgotten our address and are living at the wrong place - living in the house of fear instead of at home with the Lord. Scripture tells us that this happens to God's people over and over again: we forget, or get confused, or are reluctant to move out of the house of fear. Many of us live in the house of fear without even realizing it. We're afraid of what we know and of what we do not know. We are afraid of change and afraid of standing still. Fear shapes our decisions and our choices.

house of fear is what Nouwen calls "the house of love," the place where we can think, speak, and act in the ways of God, not in the ways of the fear-filled world.

Jesus offers us such a home even now, in the midst of our fear. Our home with God is that place where we experience the unearned, unmerited, unwarranted super-abundance of God's love and amazing grace. Being at home with God is wherever and everywhere we experience God's sacred presence.

So, are we going to abide in Christ, make our home in Christ, or are we just going to be visitors, and stop by once in a while when we need help?

As we walk through this Holy Week together, I pray that you will choose to live in God. Make your home in God so that wherever you go, you will be sheltered. Live at home in God, as God lives at home in you.
